President's Message

On behalf of the Grizzly Ranch Board of Directors, Martin Stepina, Marty Greenstein, and George Papa, I'd like to wish you and your family a very happy holiday season. We hope you can spend time with family and friends and reflect on happy memories made over the past year.

Similar to last year, we are ending 2023 with a newsletter to wrap-up the year, spread some cheer, and highlight holiday happenings as well as winter activities in and around Grizzly Ranch.

We would like to thank all the employees and volunteers who worked toward keeping Grizzly Ranch an incredible place to live.

As 2023 rolled in, we were hit with frequent heavy snowstorms which would ultimately produce more snow than Portola has seen since 1953. Many counties and cities reached all-time record snow levels in California. As with any challenge, there comes the opportunity to be creative and find ways to overcome those obstacles. Faced with the challenge of snow removal in 2022-2023, and working with Bryan Draper of Grizzly Ranch Golf, as well as the various committees, a solution was created for paying for these unexpectedly high costs and our budget was revised to meet these expenses without impacting Association dues.

At our August 4th Annual Meeting, we thanked Laura Reis for her service as a Board Member and Treasurer. Although no longer on the Board, Laura will continue to volunteer on a number of committees that interest her. Her talents will be missed on the Board.

Also on August 4th, Martin Stepina, the Vice President of the Board, agreed to remain on the Board to serve a second term and was appointed through the Acclamation process. We are thrilled to have Martin back with us for

a second term, as he is a valuable member of the Board, the committees on which he serves, and this community.

South Gate Project Update

Following a community vote in February, the construction of the south gate is underway. In August, the Board was invoiced 50% of the gate fabrication cost - which was \$27,897.50. In September, the Board paid Williams Construction \$29,495 for excavation, utilities, lumber, PSREC services and the keypad. At the end of September, Williams Construction had concrete poured for the footers of the pillars and the base for the keypad. Construction of the pillars is in progress and when complete, Tholl Fencing can install the gate and keypad.

Line of Sight Project Update

A traffic study report completed in October of 2016 recommended that the line of sight be adjusted for vehicles exiting the south gate. The grading of the area has been completed in accordance with the study's recommendations.

Let's take a look at some of the accomplishments made by the various committees.

FINANCE

When the Finance Committee was faced with the challenge of paying for snow removal due to the storms in 2023, its members brainstormed various options to avoid a special assessment to the community. The Committee's solution was different than many other Associations that had to require a special assessment for snow removal. They came up with a plan to work with the Golf Course Management team and developed a payment plan that was agreeable to both parties. A 6-month payment plan was structured with the Golf Course, and by October the golf course was paid in full for the services they provided to the community from February through April. This payment plan enabled the Association to defer payment of these first quarter expenses until quarterly dues were collected later in the year.

The Committee continues to work to maximize our investment strategies for both our Savings Account and our Reserve Account through Fidelity. As investments mature, they are reinvested into CD's or Treasury Notes that are now paying returns of up to 5.65%. With these higher rates we are looking into 3–5-year options as well as the shorter time frames. By the end of 2023, some of our investments will mature (\$171,000), and we will consider reinvesting those funds into the longer-term options.

In 2020, the Board overfunded reserves by \$150,000 in anticipation of the road Slurry Sealing project in 2021, which cost \$269,567. In 2021 we overfunded our Reserves by \$75,000, and in 2022 we overfunded our Reserves by \$69,500. In 2023 we will incur a shortfall in funding our reserves of \$91,000, due to the cost of snowplowing. Our 2024 budget, approved at the October 13, 2023 meeting, puts us back on target to fund reserves as scheduled. Our funding level as of October 17th was 52.8%; whereas, in 2021 we were at a level of 45.7%. We achieved this increase while covering all the costs for upgrading gate parts over the past 2 years. By year end 2023, we plan to be at 56.1%, and by year end 2024, our goal is to be at or above 65%. A number above 70% would put us in a strong financial rating.

In each of the past three years, the Committee developed a budget that did not require an increase in Association dues. Income from Association dues paid from the sales of GRI lots has contributed to that effort; and much credit for these sales goes to the hard work of Ron Hemig, Sierra Sotheby's real estate agent, and George Papa.

HIKING

Committee Chairperson, Ed Koenig, established a trail system signage map. The committee has identified 16 points where signs will be placed on the trails, highlighting trailheads, T-intersections on the trails, and vista points. Ed is also working with a sign maker, Bob Zwitch, to design and create signs made from a material similar to Trex, so the signs will hold up in the weather and won't require much maintenance.

The Committee has worked on clearing the Bucks Pass Trail and the Crocker Ridge Trail/Riker Trail in addition to consulting with Paul Ithurburn, of the US Forestry Service to rename the East Ridge Connector Trail in a way that will honor the firefighters who protect our community. These firefighters run our trails for training, and the committee would like to acknowledge them. We learned from Paul that on the top of Sally Peak, there is a memorial created by the Beckwourth Hotshots, in memory of Damian Rivadeneyra. He was the Captain of the crew and was very well respected in the fire community. He died tragically in a skiing accident around Christmas 2019.


DESIGN REVIEW

Firewise

We have been so fortunate that this has been a quiet wildfire season this year. One incident close to home occurred during a thunderstorm in the afternoon on May 24 when lightning struck a tree on the north side of Grizzly Ranch Road. The U.S. Forest Service stationed at Beckwourth Station on Grizzly Road responded within minutes to put out the small fire before it reached an adjacent home.



The annual Firewise education event was held on Sunday morning after Homecoming. Speakers from Beckwourth Fire Department and the U.S. Forest Service provided information about home hardening and reviewed wildfire evacuation procedures. The event was followed up with ice cream sundaes at the Outpost. The raffle of wines donated by many Grizzly Ranch members raised \$1,100 for the benefit of the Beckwourth Fire Department.

The Plumas County Fire Safe Council again provided chipping services for property owners in Plumas County. They made two visits to Grizzly Ranch this summer providing the opportunity to chip branches cleared from owners' properties.

Thank you to all of the property owners who completed the tracking sheet to document their efforts to reduce fire fuels around their property. Consolidated tracking data from Grizzly Ranch owners is one component to maintaining our recognition as a Firewise community. When combined with other communities in Plumas County, the data helps the area qualify for grants to fund Firewise activities, including the chipping program. Consolidated data also provides information for home insurance companies that may be interested in understanding fuel reduction efforts in areas they insure. In the November local general election, there were two measures on the ballot regarding the development and funding of the Beckwourth Peak Fire Protection District (FPD). The new consolidated district would provide emergency services in Eastern Plumas County currently served by the City of Portola, Beckwourth FPD, Gold Mountain Community Services District (CSD), and Sierra Valley FPD. The FPD would also serve areas that are currently outside of any local jurisdictional boundary assigned to provide services. Approval of the measures will ensure continuation of emergency services to Grizzly Ranch and surrounding areas.

To fulfill the requirements to maintain Grizzly Ranch Firewise Recognition, John Reynolds, Chair of the Plumas County Fire Safe Council, Paul Ithurburn, Captain E312 of the US Forest Service, Ken Osburn, Interim Chief of the Beckwourth Fire District, and members of the Firewise Committee participated in a Risk assessment of Grizzly Ranch on October 17. While the development in general is in good shape, several areas were identified that need some work, for example, to remove dried vegetation and dead trees, thin out saplings, trim ladder fuels and remove pine needles from rooftops. The CC&Rs Section 8.2, outlines owners' maintenance obligations, including removal of dead or diseased/infested trees and vegetation for fire prevention and safety purposes. We encourage owners to maintain their property to help keep Grizzly Ranch safe.

WATER TANK INSPECTION

Blue Locker Diving was hired to perform a potable water tank dive inspection for Grizzly Ranch CSD. They inspected the tank utilizing a certified commercial diver, backup diver, and tender for their operations. BLD Divers are NACE certified and have over 20 years of commercial diving experience on both enclosed and open water reservoirs. They were hired to observe both interior and exterior coatings, structural integrity as well as report any safety and/or health code violations with both video and photos taken to record the condition of the tank. The tank interior was vacuum cleaned, and ½ inch of bottom sediment was removed. Overall, the tank is in good condition. As the tank is 22 years old, the coating system will require a waterblast and a recoat in 3-5 years. This will help prolong the life of the original coating system to provide an anticipated life of 35 years.



COMMUNITY SERVICE DISTRICT RATE STUDY UPDATE

We would like to take this opportunity to share some information with our customers pertaining to the recent notice that you should have all received about the possible change to our water and wastewater rates.

The Community Services District (CSD) has the capacity to provide water and sewer treatment services to over 300 customers in Grizzly Ranch. The District last reviewed the schedule of rates and charges in 2021. At that time, for connected customers, we initiated a base charge for system use as well as a rate for water volume usage, in addition to the annual standby parcel tax.

This year, Grizzly Ranch CSD retained DOWL Engineering to perform a condition assessment of the existing water and sewer assets and provide an analysis of user rates for its water and sewer systems. The condition assessment was performed in order to identify any deficiencies in the distribution and collection system. The District's assets have not been assessed since the system was constructed in 2004. The water system consists of a treatment plant, three wells, one storage tank, and 6.2 miles of water pipes ranging from 6 to 8 inches. The existing sewer system consists of a wastewater treatment/recycle facility, an emergency storage pond, an irrigation pond, and 5.8 miles of low-pressure collection system.

The full rate study completed by DOWL Engineering can be viewed at grizzlyranchesd.com. The rates calculated in the study for the sewer and water utilities follow industry-standard principles of equitable cost-of-service allocations that are in compliance with Proposition 218.

The District's current rate structure includes an annual standby rate, a quarterly base rate, and a volumetric rate tied to water consumption. The standby rate is charged as a tax and applies to both active and inactive customers, while the quarterly base rate and volumetric rates apply to active customers only and are billed separately from the standby charge.

As a result of ongoing capital projects and existing debt service, the sewer fund is operating at a cash flow deficiency.

The water fund, on the other hand, is in a solid financial position and revenue from rates are sufficient to cover annual expenses. For the sewer fund, it is recommended that the District increase rates in order to fund our operating expenses, debt service, and capital projects. The goal of these rate adjustments is to increase revenue by 13.9% each year from FY 24 through FY 26 and continue to implement annual automatic adjustments equal to CPI thereafter (dependent on Board of Directors and current financial positions.)

Since the current water rates are sufficient to fund annual operating expenses, no increase was recommended. However, through the cost-of-service process, the water rates need to be restructured to ensure equitable charges among customer classes. It is recommended that the District continue to adjust rates equal to CPI on an annual basis.

RATE STUDY DETAILS

Methods

DOWL performed a visual assessment of the District's water treatment plant, 2 booster stations, and wastewater treatment plant. Acoustic leak detection was used to find possible leaks in the sewer low-pressure collection system and the water distribution system. and the water distribution system.

Sewer System Assessment

No leaks were discovered in the sewer collection system, and therefore no improvement projects resulted from the condition assessment.

Sewer System Revenue Requirements

The revenue requirement presents the relationship between revenue collected from user fees and the costs incurred by serving those customers. This study performed an analysis over the 5-year study period and was used to determine the approximate rate adjustments needed to support projected expenses and capital improvement projects for the sewer system. In the course of developing the revenue requirement, it is assumed that the District's sewer utility, as an enterprise fund, is self-sufficient and without financial support from other funds. This analysis found that the existing sewer rates are not sufficient to fund ongoing capital projects over the next 5 years. As a result, annual increases were recommended.

Water System Assessment

Through the visual assessment, deficiencies were identified. The water treatment plant has a chlorine analyzer, flange adapter, and ductile iron pipe 90-degree elbow that had been rusted due to age. The water distribution assessment results reveal leaks occurring at a yard hydrant and two fire hydrant assemblies.

Water System Revenue Requirements

The water fund revenue requirement takes place over the 5-year study period and was used to determine the approximate revenue adjustments needed to support projected expenses and capital improvement projects. Based on the analysis, the revenues generated from the water fund are sufficient to fund annual operating expenses. Through the cost-of-service process, as required by Proposition 218, it was found that the existing rates should be restructured to ensure that customers pay the rate in proportion to their impact on the system.

If any customers have questions about this study and the proposed rate increase/restructure, please reach out to the staff at the office, and they will be happy to answer those questions. If you have not received your notice and ballot, please contact the office to update your mailing address or contact information. Written protests on the quarterly base and volumetric rates are being accepted at the office. A hearing for the proposed increase will take place on Tuesday, Nov. 14, 2023, at the Grizzly Ranch Outpost at 9 a.m. Thank you for your continued support.


