




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A Message From Our Newsletter Committee

Hiking in the Lost Sierra with a little guidance

If you were to ask a group of people what it is about the Lost Sierra that attracts them to the area, I'm sure you would hear quite a few different answers. There truly is so much to do, but hiking is at the top of many people's list. The beauty of the outdoors is calling, and we must go.

I recently had the opportunity to speak with Tom Demund, the author of the popular hiking guidebook titled "Feather River Country Adventure Trails". When my husband and I built our home in 2009, we were introduced to Tom's book. We enjoy marking the hikes we have completed by bent pages or sticky note tabs. The comprehensive book is a must-have for those who want to explore the many trails of the Northern Sierra.

Tom came to the Feather River Country area in 1965 and fell in love with the area. After vacationing many years in Graeagle, he and his family built a log cabin there in 1992. This gave him the opportunity to spend a lot of time every summer hiking and learning about the Feather River Country trails that he has written about in his book. He spent 3 years researching the area and trails for his first edition published in 2001 which includes 100 hiking trails. He recently released his 7th edition. In each new edition, he has "thrown out" 3-4 trails he doesn't think are so interesting and adds 3-4 new ones.

When asked what makes the 7th edition different from the previous ones, Tom explains this one specializes in shorter hikes. At age


85 he says he's not quite up to 10 to 12 mile hikes like he used to be and wanted to focus on hikes for families. It is full of 1 to 3 mile hikes for family day trips.

Tom likes to support our local stores, so you can find a copy of his book at Leonard's Market in Portola, J & J's Grizzly Store, Graeagle Store, Graeagle Mill Works or the visitors bureau in Graeagle.

If you are a hiker or are just interested in learning about the beauty of the mountains that surround us, pick up Tom's latest edition. It may be one of your best purchases ever!

PORTOLA/GRAEAGLE AREA RESTAURANTS

Taco Tuesday is a fundraiser for the Elks Club located on Highway 70 just outside Portola. Held in the summer on Tuesdays from 5-7p.m., it's SUPER casual serving beef tacos and taco salads along with beer and mixed drinks.

Cuccia's in Blairsden has consistently good Italian Cuisine, this place opens at 5 p.m. dinner except Sunday and Monday when they are closed. Reservations recommended.

The Vyne by Cuccia's is a relatively new place in Blairsden also run by owners of Cuccia's. Here you'll find wine tasting with a tapas menu, outdoor seating on the patio or in a shaded yard. Open for lunch from noon to 4 p.m. with a happy hour 4-5 p.m.

Grizzly Grill comes with some very good recommendations as does **The Coyote Grill** both in Blairsden.

Gumbas is the place for casual food and dining in Blairsden is well recommended with good pizzas, Italian dishes, craft beer, and more in a friendly atmosphere.

Bread and Butter is a food truck with great sandwiches which makes waiting in a long line worth the wait! If you have to go to the **Hardware stor**e in Blairsden, take a lunch break here.

The Brewing Lair is known for its locally crafted beer and fun outdoor picnic area. This place is SUPER Casual!! The Brewing Lair has a new addition this year...food, as The Ricochet Cafe in Clio moved its food truck to the Brewing Lair.







Nakoma's Wigwam Room, renamed FIFTY44, won rave reviews last year for Chef Brooke's cuisine, and she's back for 2021! The ambiance is great, and Friday evenings dining on the deck with live music is a special experience, but remember to carry a sweater and a sun hat.

Whitehawk Restaurant, speaking of good Chef's returning, Brent and Katie are back at Whitehawk, and happy hour is from 4-5:30 p.m. and includes a few food items. Dinner service starts at 5:30 p.m. Open every day except Tuesday. Reservations required.

The Iron Door, many enjoy the Iron Door restaurant in Johnsville surrounded by antiques from the 1800s. Open every day except Tuesday at 5 p.m. Reservations recommended.

Los Dos Hermanos is located in Sierraville on your way to Truckee, this place has been highly recommended for many years for its Mexican food. They don't take reservations.

AND let's not forget our **LAKE HOUSE**!! Right here in our own backyard. Talk about AMBIANCE, good casual food, cocktails, and friendly folks! Watching the golfers come in and enjoying the sights and sounds of our waterfalls and so much more is another special experience only found at Grizzly Ranch.

NOW FOR RENO RESTAURANTS

As a full time resident of Reno, except of course when my family and I are at Grizzly, here are some of our recommendations along with input from some of my friends as well.

The Stone House has an extensive menu and a patio for summer dining. The food is consistently good.

Rattlesnake Club - Right next door is the newer Rattlesnake Club. A mouth-watering appetizer of "Firecracker Shrimp" and their Caesar Salad will keep you coming back.

Napa Sonoma Grocery Co. is in the Plumgate Center. Here you'll find very good food, a bar, with a casual vibe and less pricey than some of the other options. Great for lunch or dinner.

Portofino for Italian food is always consistently good! Their special ravioli entree is highly recommended.

Miguels Mexican Food in Midtown has been a locals' favorite for years! Consistently good!

Bricks Restaurant and Wine Bar is a fine dining restaurant that many locals enjoy, and it's great for a "special occasion". A tasty appetizer is the cold cucumber soup.

Arario's is another local favorite for Korean Fusion food located in Midtown. You definitely need a reservation.

Midtown Eats is known for a great burger, fresh veggies, and a soothing cocktail!

The Twisted Fork in South Reno has very good food should you find yourself hungry and south of town. The vibe is very casual dress, and food selections are varied with good salads, tacos, etc.

Jazmine is a great option for Chinese food along with sushi. Located in South Reno, it's a good choice too if you're looking for nice ambiance.

Hinoki Sushi comes highly recommended by the local fresh fish market Sierra Gold Seafood...and these folks know fresh fish!!

Beaujolais is for those who are looking to dine near the Truckee River. Beaujolais is locally owned and affords a charming dining experience, but it can be quite pricey, so it's another "special occasion restaurant". Reservations are a must.

The Shore Room located in downtown Reno inside the Renaissance Hotel is a wonderful choice for dining along the river and a must for patio dining! The food has always been excellent offering a fine dining experience and reservations are a must. If you have time, stay and play some indoor Bocce Ball at their amazing indoor venue.

Liberty Food and Wine Exchange is another Downtown Reno restaurant located at 100 N. Sierra Street just down the block from Campo and the Truckee River. The chef uses fresh, local, handmade items to create an eclectic menu.



Woodpeckers and Flickers

Sandy and Dave Sailer built their house in Grizzly Ranch in 2009, and the first few years went by smoothly without a woodpecker invasion. That changed about 7 years ago. It seemed like the house screamed "come get me" to woodpeckers! They tried the mylar strips, the plastic owl, and a few other things to get rid of the Northern Flicker that was destroying the home. They tried covering some of the holes with tin squares - trying to match the color of the wood stain. As many owners in GR experience, nothing seemed to be working, and they continued to research ways to get rid of these beautiful but annoying birds.

One day Dave read that flickers return each year to the same area for nesting. He learned about a "flicker house" and decided to try one. He read, "If your neighborhood flicker is pecking a hole in a building, fill the birdhouse with wood chips, and position it over the unwanted excavation to provide a more suitable nesting location". Since they mounted the birdhouse 5 years ago, flickers have come back each year and nested in it, and they find them fun to watch. Some pecking is still heard each morning during the flicker season," but the Sailers feel more comfortable knowing the flickers are staying in one area inside the flicker house. It has been a definite improvement.

Is there a 100% solution to the pesky woodpecker/flicker? Probably not. When you live in a wood home in the forest, you have to just accept some things.

Here are a few more tips. Woodpeckers and flickers can be a big problem. They seem to pick on certain houses and can cause quite a bit of damage. Visual deterrents are the most cost effective way to deal with these birds. Try the iridescent bird deterrent foil also known as holographic flash tape. This shiny tape creates a visual distraction zone that disorientates and scares the birds away. After trying lots of different shiny products, this seems to work the best.

<u>This website</u> outlines how to patch small and large holes in cedar siding. There are lots of alternatives online, but this one is pretty good. Most sites recommend using epoxy filler or wood filler that you can sand and stain to match the existing siding for small holes.

2021 looks to be an exciting year, as we've received several projects that have been approved and are either starting or are on the drawing board. Renewed interest from several builders along with sparked excitement in homesites for sale have stimulated a more far-reaching inquisitiveness in Grizzly Ranch.





GR Roads

During last month, our Community's roads had cracks and edge damage repaired and more significantly, a complete surface application of a Type II Slurry seal. Improvements in road maintenance technologies and a continuation of moderate wear-and-tear affecting our road surfaces has allowed the HOA to adjust its long-term program for road maintenance to postpone the very costly (\$1.830M) complete road asphalt overlay previously scheduled to occur in 2028. Our new program, started last month, emphasizes a diligent preventive maintenance program to prolong the useful life of the asphalt surface, consisting of (i) annual crack and edge repairs, (ii) Type II Slurry sealing every 7 years, and (iii) the application of a complete Cape Seal surface (which is an asphalt emulsion with 3/8" aggregate chips together with a Type II Slurry Seal) planned for 2035. This approach could significantly postpone the necessity for a complete road surface replacement for many more years. This newer approach saves the Community approximately \$800K over our previous maintenance program through 2047. We appreciate the patience and cooperation of our property owners, the golf course and the CSD while last month's road maintenance efforts created some inconvenience to traffic flows.

Grizzly Ranch Conservancy, a nonprofit 501 (C)3, created in 2004 to manage waterways, wetlands and wildlife habitat on the property to comply with federal, state and local development permits, seeks to preserve the unique character and natural environment in and around Grizzly Ranch. Recognizing that hiking is a major amenity of the GR environment and lifestyle experience, the Conservancy's first community priority was to develop a system of interconnected trails connecting the community with open spaces and adjacent public lands. These trails provide residents a variety of ways to enjoy nature while learning about

the protection and preservation of natural habitats. More than 5 miles of trails meander through 1,040 acres of spectacular Sierra Nevada terrain, highlighting panoramic views, providing access to Big Grizzly Creek and connecting to the surrounding public lands. We encourage volunteer efforts and will continue to use surplus funds for trail maintenance. In June we cleaned Big Grizzly Creek, Beckwourth Crossing, Bucks Pass, and The Deer Run trails.

Grizzly Ranch Internet Committee

The Board and a group of interested and knowledgeable owners are investigating options for improved high speed internet service at Grizzly Ranch, including:



Plumas Sierra Telecom (PST) Fiber Optic:

Conduit is installed at Grizzly Ranch, but its condition is unknown. A 2017 proposal showed an initial infrastructure cost of about \$400,000 with individual lot install costs of \$300 to \$500 and monthly fees of \$75-\$110. Since then, fiber optic cable has been installed from Highway 70 up to and past Grizzly Ranch, so about half of the previously estimated cost is no longer applicable. The original proposal included an estimate of \$150,000 to prepare the conduit for use. We are contemplating the enlistment of a group of Grizzly volunteers to perform that work. The remainder of the prior estimate included \$187,000 to PST to install the fiber infrastructure. Service rebates from PST of \$143,000 were also included, but we don't have any details of how those were to be structured. A special assessment would likely be required to cover the install cost.

Grizzly Ranch Internet Committee Cont'd

We have agreed to pay a nominal fee to PST to resurvey Grizzly Ranch and its needs, and present an updated proposal. The original estimate of install costs will likely increase due to increased material and labor costs, but the new competition from the SpaceX Starlink Satellite Service may also be a factor. We should have an updated proposal from PST in several months.

The cost of obtaining the PST Fiber Optic service would be the most expensive internet solution for the residents of Grizzly Ranch. However, the dependability of service would be superior to the alternatives, since signals in fiber are not subject to electromagnetic interference or weather. The range of available service packages include download speeds ranging from 50 Mbps, at a cost of \$79 per month, to 1 Gbps, at a cost of \$299 per month. There are no data caps on the service packages. The latency would be the best available here. The dependability and performance provided by fiber would likely allow many users to eliminate their satellite TV subscriptions and eliminate any issues with Zoom sessions.

Digital Path Internet:



Digital Path service is used by a number of Grizzly Ranch owners. It is a wireless service and requires unobstructed line of sight to the Digital Path transmitter. The data speeds available depend upon the distance between your home and the Digital Path transmitter. Digital Path offers Standard Rural Plans and Gen7 Rural Plans to Grizzly Ranch residents. The Rural Plans are serviced from transmitters on the top of Beckwourth Peak or from a relay transmitter located on the ridge between Portola and Grizzly Ranch. The Gen7 Plans are only serviced from transmitters on the top of Beckwourth Peak. The Grizzly Ranch Golf Club and the Sales Office use

Digital Path Gen7 service.

The Gen7 plans are available at Grizzly Ranch with download speeds of either 25 Mbps or 50 Mbps. The 25 Mbps plan cost starts at \$71 per month and the 50 Mbps plan cost starts at \$96 per month. There are multiple plans available at each speed, to offer a range of data caps. Digital Path data caps are called 'soft caps', since the service continues to operate at a significantly reduced speed once the data limit is reached. The available speed, or even the availability of Gen7, will depend on the distance to the transmitter. Some Grizzly Ranch residents have been refused Gen7 service because of distance. Others have the 25 Mbps service, but actually experience much less than the stated speed, again due to distance limitations.

The Standard plans are available at Grizzly Ranch with download speeds of 3 Mbps, 6 Mbps or 10 Mbps. The 3 Mbps plan cost starts at \$67.95 per month, the 6 Mbps plan cost starts at \$77.95 per month and the 10 Mbps plan cost starts at \$92.95 per month.

Overall, the Digital Path service has a history of performance and dependability issues. For service provided from transmitters on Beckwourth Peak, electromagnetic interference is an issue. There are antennas on the peak for many different services and they tend to interfere with each other. Also, weather can be a factor effecting reception, since heavy precipitation can attenuate the wireless signals.

SpaceX Starlink Satellite Service:



Elon Musk's Starlink project will be coming to Portola, likely sometime between mid 2021 and the end of 2021. Several Grizzly Ranch owners have signed up and are on the waiting list for receivers, to test out the service. The initial equipment cost is \$500, with a \$100 per month service fee. There is only a single level

of service and there are currently no data caps. The service is currently in Beta and is being rolled out southward from a starting latitude of 53 degrees north. Starlink is promising download speeds of 50 Mbps to 150 Mbps and Latency of 20 to 40 milliseconds initially. Reports from current Beta users indicate that those promises are being met, and then some. Current Beta users are also reporting that there are times of short outage of service due to obstructed line of sight and the current number of deployed satellites. The current launch schedule provides an additional 60 satellites every two weeks, on average. As the number of satellites increases, the data speeds will increase, latency will be reduced and the required amount of sky that is free of obstructions will be reduced.

Obtaining reliable Starlink service could be difficult for lots where there is heavy tree cover and limited visibility of the sky. Currently, a clear sky viewed through a 100 degree cone aimed in a northerly direction at a minimum elevation angle 25 degrees is required. As more satellites are available, the minimum elevation angle will increase to 40 degrees. However, there is no current indication from SpaceX that the 100 degree angle of the cone of view will reduce.

The Starlink system is very different from any other satellite internet systems. Other systems utilize a single satellite that is parked in a stationary geosynchronous orbit. Therefore, only a clear line of site to a single point in the sky is required. However, latency times are typically greater than 500 milliseconds, due to the distance of the satellite above the earth. The Starlink system utilizes a constellation of many satellites at a much lower altitude. Therefore, latency times are much lower and a clear sky is required to cover the area of sky that includes the satellite that is passing out of sight and the next one that is coming along to continue providing service. A Starlink app is available for Android and iPhone to check for a location with the required sky clearance. The Starlink service is also different than any other internet offering in that it is very much a DIY project. The dish and router are shipped to the customer and installation is left to the customer. Elon Musk states that he does not want a fleet of trucks running around the country with Starlink logos on their sides.



T-Mobile Home Internet:

T-Mobile has a new home internet offering that utilizes their 5G network. They currently have 5G service provided from the top of Beckwourth Peak. However, the home internet service is not currently available to Grizzly Ranch addresses. T-Mobile will need to improve their cellular service to our location to offer the service here. Several Grizzly Ranch residents have T-Mobile cellular phone service. The signal strength at Grizzly Ranch is quite variable. It ranges from no signal at some locations to 5G service capable of greater than 90 Mbps download speed at other locations.
